#### **Smokin in the Cotswolds**

Took the RE Turbo Twin in the back of my car on my hols to the Cotswolds again this year, staying there for 3 weekends worth of VMCC events. The trip was built around the Cotswold section 'Diamond Jubilee Celebration' of the 12<sup>th</sup> & 13<sup>th</sup> July (2014).

The first event was organised by the North Cotswold section, Sunday 6<sup>th</sup> July, entitled the 'Gamekeeper Run'. The run started from Chipping Campden shortly after 10am., a drop off (leap frog as they call it) system was used to take us through some varied roads, all scenic, into the Malvern area. Some 20 machines, arrived at the 'Gamekeepers' cottage some 3 miles NE of Hereford in good time for lunch. A very good buffet spread laid on for us, brilliantly sunny day, a huge shady tree with seating below, and plenty of good chat. No 'charge' for lunch, the helmet being passed around for donations to the local air ambulance. The return route included a stop for a welcome local ice cream and following on from here people leaving the line of machines to make their own way home.

Next event for me was a mid week run, again with the North Cotswold section. Meeting at a members house at Adlestrop for a late breakfast (sausage or bacon roll, coffee, tea etc), very civilised, we eventually set of on an interesting 40 mile route around the countryside for a pub lunch in Stanton Hardcourt just west of Oxford. Very hot and sunny, the return trip of 30 miles cooled me down! Unexpected was more refreshment on our return. Several interesting machines including a pair of Rover motorcycles and an early Ariel square four. Donations this time to the local village hall fund.

On to the main event, over the past 10 years I have taken part in quite a few Cotswold section events, the main attraction to me being they have a competitive element to them, both with route finding and 'knowledge of (vintage) motorcycling'. The Saturday event was more social, meeting at 10am. at Chedworth village hall, with a run to the steam railway at Toddington Station, (supposedly for tea but ice cream was more in order). Seems a popular venue as various other clubs were also visiting, both car and motorcycle (and cycle). Particularly of interest, a number of AJS! No not the motorcycles, cars, 8 of them! As some wag said, all of them! About 40 machines on this run, mainly vintage, mine being one of the younger. Returned to Chedworth for an excellent sit down meal, about 80 people including one of the original section members. Good display of the history of the section to be studied, and a nice souvenir booklet. Following lunch a few introductions and short speeches, then to my utter amazement the (only) award for 'the motorcycle I would most like to take home with me as voted for by those present' - my Turbo Twin! Given the line up outside, this has to be the best award I have ever won with the Turbo Twin by a long way.

Sunday's event was an early start to get to Miserden village hall, consisting of a 'Cloverleaf run'. Basically this comprises of three loops (which are bidirectional), every entrant will ride each loop once, collecting instructions for your next loop as you return to 'base'. On each loop are three 'self' check points and three questions at each, the first being something to identify you are at the correct point, (an anagram or calculation rather than straight forward observation) the other two being related to VMCC or vintage motorcycling. To add to the mix it is both an individual and a team event. Having had moderate results in previous events I had volunteered to make up the number (three) if anyone else wanted a team member, seems I was not the only one and Jenny the secretary had teamed up three of us with two strokes - 'Smoker's Corner'! Met up briefly with my team mates, Nigel and his wife on a 1960 Puch and Mike on a MZ. The weather was not so kind today, the only day I needed waterproofs, the roads are very minor and needed respect! Great fun though, people riding in all directions, always meeting up with someone else when stopping at question locations! Eventually finish for a late lunch, as you can imagine results are not

immediately available and will be posted on the section web site when available. The section is running a 'tour week' immediately following on, so not before the following weekend. Weather had improved greatly for the run home and I actually washed the RE, it needed it! Was home before I got to see the results, wow what a surprise, I had the top score of the day! Nigel came second to me in our class and Mike had won his class = 'Smoker's Corner' are the winners of the team award!

Monday was a short trip to Chipping Campden again, joining with the guys on the touring week to visit a well hidden private collection of three wheelers. Wasn't sure what to expect and pleasantly surprised to find a few real old and rare vehicles. A 1904 Rexette tri-car, presently being spruced up, a 1920 MV Bambina, now the only one in existence, a 1934 Sandford (French) and a genuine 1932/5 works Morgan, raced a few years ago by the owner, gave up racing it as he wanted to preserve its originality! Also a BSA three wheeler used quite regularly for touring, and his mate was along with a 1926 Austin 7 Sports 'Burghley', I think the first time I have seen this model, other than in pictures. Tucked away in the workshop is a Raleigh 'Safety' model undergoing refurbishment and a whole collection of interesting spare engines and memorabilia. Wednesday I went to the touring week base at Minchinhampton for a ride out to Slimbridge (Wildfowl & Wetlands Trust). Unfortunately there was a change in destination, they were going to Toddington Station! As I was looking forward to Slimbridge I went on my own and spent a lot longer there than I had anticipated, lots to see, a much larger 'public accessible' area than I expected. Surprised by how much time I spent in the hides overlooking the estuary, rewarded by seeing (2 small specks in my photo) the now wild cranes along with other wildlife and especially (as you would expect), birds!

Thursday I took a long run to Lower Broadheath to join up with the Worcestershire section on their Wrinkly run to the Cosford RAF air museum, adjacent to the working RAF base. 3 large hangers worth of aircraft and supporting vehicles etc., along with much memorabilia to be looked at. What made this a particularly interesting visit was being with mainly retired gents from the surrounding area, many of them had worked in the industries involved in the building of the aircraft subsequent to WW2.

That brought to an end my 'riding' holiday, just short of an additional 900 miles on the clock! To round off I also went to the Taverners section 'Founders Day' event at Stanford Hall (grounds). As this included a large motorcycle auto-jumble I opted for the car, and what an auto-jumble, nearly all devoted to proper old British stuff and keeping them on the road. Have not seen proper Vintage and Veteran complete? machines or large parts for, at an auto-jumble for years, prices seemed reasonable and all. The show (what I saw of it) was interesting, the theme as many this year was focused on military motorcycling.

Mistake taking the car though, returned with an empty wallet!
