Rotavating in the Isle of Man

This will disappoint the gardeners of this world as it is not a story of Manx Horticulture but refers to a phrase first used (as far as I am concerned) by a pal enquiring about my biking plans for the weekend using my Norton Rotary Commander such as "doing any rotavating this weekend?".

My most recent rotavating event was when my son James and I attended the 2015 IoM TT a spectacular event not only for the year that Hutchy came good again one of those "where were you times when Ian won his ninth TT, change that to tenth hang on now there's an eleventh" and when we thought it could not get any better the Morecambe Missile John McGuinness won his 23rd TT in the senior in record time a remarkable display by one if not the best motorcycle road racers of all time.

Leaving our home north of Aberdeen for Heysham we rode through high winds and heavy rain, the Commander is great in wet weather with the body work diverting nearly all the spray and the warmth from the engine keeping my toes toasty but in a cross wind it can be a bit like riding a barn door, I'm sure we spent most of the journey at 45 degrees. We eventually arrived at the ferry terminal in time to catch the 0215 ferry, an ungodly hour but the only crossing left even though we had booked well in advance "book early to avoid disappointment" is true when attending the TT, once we arrived in Douglas and being far too early to get into our lodgings we decided to ride the course, even at such an early hour the sports bike boys and girls were out flying past at huge speed the TT does indeed bring out the worst in some folk needless to say the Commander completed the course in a refined and the stately manner, that's the story I'm sticking to and my son has been sworn to secrecy.

The next few days were spent enjoying the fantastic weather some excellent racing a tour of the island and a visit to the Isle of Man Motor Museum Jurby where there is amongst a number of really interesting cars and bikes an F1, a most enjoyable experience made even more so by the attention received by the Commander, Guy Martin is a great bloke and finds the attention from the media and general public trying, I now know how he feels; everywhere we went interested folk wanted to know "is that a rotary?" the French contingent asked "le moteur rotatif?" our German friends said "Wankel Motor?" and some find chaps from Sweden said "is that a rotary, we do not have any in Sweden and when asked if they wanted to own the only rotary in Sweden they declined, to be fair I would not have sold my bike it means far too much to me. There were also a number of our fellow countrymen who showed interest with tales of when they visited Shenstone, many said they had always wanted a Commander and even when queuing for the return ferry crossing with bikers each side there would be a tap on the shoulder with a thumbs up.

The journey back home was uneventful with dry and sunny conditions, the Commander was happy to cruise at 4500 RPM a nice steady 75 MPH, during the whole of the trip having completed nearly 1000 miles the bike performed impeccably and even the clackity clack sound from the gearbox when idling and on the overrun did not seem any the worse for the journey.

Now safely in the garage I will change the oil in the primary chain case, gearbox and enclosed rear chain, clean the pugs and give the Commander a bit of a spruce up ready for the trip to the NOC National Rally in Wales at the end of June.
